Our youngest students have been actively engaged in exploring the joys of photography. Beginning in the library and extending their inquiry units of *How the World Works* and *How We Express Ourselves*, preschoolers were introduced to our small point-andshoot digital cameras.

Their excitement was palpable! Each student had their own camera and investigated the inner workings first.

They were able to identify and discuss the parts of the camera, including the battery (which makes the camera go), and the memory card (which stores the pictures).





They problem-solved how to turn them on and off and how to manipulate the large cameras with their smaller hands.

Once they had the cameras in their hands, they began to explore their surroundings, including the areas inside and outside the library and more indepth within their classroom. Their subjects are personal and intimate. From creations they made,





materials in the classroom, to artistic drawings, friends, teachers, and the beauty of the TASOK campus.



'A Day in the Life of a Grade 6 Student' – What to expect.

If you mention 'Jump Up Day' to Grade 5 students you will receive a uniform response. They will all literally jump up and down and start laughing. One thing is for sure the students certainly acted enthusiastically to the name of the occasion and hopefully found the activities themselves just as memorable.

Our librarian, Ms. Kraft, headed the run-up to Jump Up Day by asking the class to write down some of



their most pressing questions to be answered as a major piece of the program to follow.

You can always guess the top 3 concerns from Grade 5 students as they transcend time and place; Do I get a locker? Where is my locker? What happens if I lose the key to my locker? That big step from Elementary to Secondary, where the possibilities of weighty questions seem almost endless is always reduced to lockers. Occasionally the amount of homework expected in Grade 6 may make the top three, but there's just something about lockers that fascinates Grade 5 students.



This is rather ironic since lockers haven't been used this year due to social distancing, but perhaps next year and then I'm sure a whole new flurry of locker questions will take on a world importance. Apart from the lockers Grade 5 came up with some very worthwhile questions, that were answered, by the principals, teachers, and a panel of Grade 6 students. Discussions also took place looking at the similarities and differences between the Middle Years Programme (MYP) and their present Primary Years Programme (PYP).

To provide some variety to the day a scavenger hunt sent the class scurrying in all directions, as they discovered where rooms and facilities were located. They also had the chance to join the Secondary for lunch and wave to older family members who were passing between lessons. The second day provided an MYP lesson taster, where groups of Grade 5 students worked alongside the Grade 6 classes solving Math problems, acting in a Performing Arts class, learning more about Design, and watching videos that had been made by the Grade 6 English class.

Now the transition process passes to the parents, who I'm sure are also very anxious to have their questions answered and learn more about the MYP, although I imagine lockers will feature lower on the priority list. On Friday 4th June at 2 pm in the Library, Mr. Austin the MYP Coordinator, and I will be providing a parent transition meeting to address your questions and provide information in preparation for next year.

Blair Cochran: Grade 4





Theory of Knowledge Exhibition – Grade 11 *Garrett Austin – IB History/MYP & DP*

On Friday, May 21, TASOK hosted the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) exhibition for the 11th grade DP students. The exhibition explores how TOK manifests in the world around us, and students base it on one of the TOK themes studied during class: knowledge and the knower, knowledge and religion, or knowledge and politics.





The TOK exhibition is an internal assessment component—it is marked by the teacher and is externally moderated by the IB. Internal assessment is an integral part of all DP courses. It enables students to demonstrate the application of their skills and knowledge, and to pursue their personal interests. For this task, students were required to create their exhibition using three objects that connect to one of the 35 "IA Prompts" provided by the IB. Students must

select just one IA prompt on which to base their exhibition, and all three objects must be linked to the same IA prompt. Accompanying the objects is a written commentary that describes what the object is and how it is personally connected to the student, a justification for why they have included it in the exhibition, and an explanation of how it connects to the prompt that the student selected.



This was the first year of the TOK exhibition, replacing the TOK presentation from the old curriculum. Our students exceeded all expectations for the depth of their analysis, the personal relevance all of their exhibitions showed, and their professionalism and poise while discussing their chosen prompts and responses. Thank you to all the parents, teachers, and students that were able to come to experience the exhibition and learn how TOK manifests in the world around us.

What are the implications of having, or not having, knowledge? Are some types of knowledge less open to interpretation than others? How can we know that current knowledge is an improvement upon past knowledge? What role does imagination play in producing knowledge about the world?

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So then we decided to ask the experts. We discovered many of the parents of the grade 7 students have interesting jobs. So we learnt how to write a formal letter, and invited people to come and answer our questions regarding their career paths.



We were very lucky that many parents, friends of parents, and even some TASOK support staff agreed to be on our 13-strong panel of career experts.

In preparation, we practised making up lots of questions, we learnt about closed questions and open questions, and we learnt the power of both types of questions. We were ready!

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Career Day was fascinating thanks to the vast array of experience among the panel. We had architects, a property developer, embassy managers and attachés (both Swedish and American), a journalist and spokesman for Monusco, foreign aid workers, an animal scientist, a city planner, an IT manager, an electrician, and a UN firefighter (and yes, he brought his fire truck!). Most of our guests were on their second, or even third career. They had all done many other different types of jobs in the past, from McDonald's, to politics, to teaching. Grade 7 students asked some great questions, and learnt a lot about the university degrees they might consider, jobs they didn't even know existed and of course, how to hold a water hose when putting out a fire!



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The final part of Career Day was writing another formal letter. This one was to thank our visitors for taking time out of what we learnt




Should Someone in Your Family/Household Test Positive for COVID-19:

- 1. Keep your child and all siblings home from school and isolate.
- 2. Immediately consult a doctor and have everyone in the household tested for COVID-19
 - 1. This includes all TASOK students (regardless of age)
 - 2. This includes all family members in the household
- 3. Immediately inform the school of your situation and all symptom/testing details so that we can start the contact tracing process.
- 4. Quarantine as recommended for up to 14 days until all family members retest negative.
- 5. Provide the Nurse with a negative COVID-19 test result and follow instructions.
- 6. Students will not be allowed to return until all family members have tested negative.

Should a Family Member of a Student in Your Child's Class Test Positive for COVID-19:

- 1. Once the school is notified (Step 3 above), we will ask the remainder of students in that grade level (and teacher) to stay home and isolate until the student in question has COVID test results submitted to the school (Step 2 above).
 - 1. If the test result is **POSITIVE** the remaining students in that grade level (and teacher) will be required to have a COVID-19 test **AND** all siblings will be asked to remain at home until the test results are in.
 - 2. If the test result is **NEGATIVE** the remaining students in that grade level (and teacher) will return to school and resume normal instruction.
