
Masks will continue to be worn when arriving at school, in classrooms, and when lining up.







UPDATED TASOK QUARANTINE GUIDELINES (English et Français):




















How do you read your Child's Report?

On February 2nd, Secondary School Semester 1 reports will be issued on ManageBac. The first step is to log into ManageBac and read through the subject reports, preferably with your child. You would be surprised by the number of parents who don't open these reports and share in their child's academic progress. Whereas reporting is a major tool in strengthening the partnership between the school and parents in following and supporting a student's learning journey. As you read the report consider the various purposes that it serves. The comments provide a synopsis of your child's performance within each subject area. Comments help to identify areas of strength, those required for further improvement, and strategies to support and extend learning. Reports can also provide valuable information that informs decision-making for future subjects and career choices. From the student's point of view, they see proof of their own development in turn encouraging them to take responsibility for their own learning.

Reports are an official document that is required by schools and colleges once, your child leaves TASOK. Each subject has four criteria, determined by the International Baccalaureate, that are skill-based and include a descriptor. Each criterion mark is graded out of 8 and is determined through a range of summative assessment tasks. For instance, the recent examinations in Grades 9-11 are included as one of several summatives. Therefore, missing an exam due to COVID-related issues will not have an impact on the overall grade, which instead will be supported through the summative work collected through the semester. The reports contain an overall numerical grade, 1-7. This is gained by adding the criterion scores and matching this to the subject boundary indicated at the bottom of each subject report. An overall grade of a '2' is considered a failing mark. From grades 9 upwards this overall mark is recorded on student transcripts required by colleges and will have an impact on acceptance offers.

The final area you will notice on each subject page are the learning skill indicators, 'Organization', 'Engagement' and 'Initiative'. These provide information on your child's attitude and commitment to learning and are indicated as EE- Exceeds Expectations, ME=Meets Expectations, AE= Approaches Expectations, and NI=Needs Improvement. A fuller explanation of the indicators and the 1-7 overall grade descriptors can be found in the final pages of the report.

Revisiting safety procedures





After returning from break, ES students and teachers revisited our safety procedures and protocols. In the Elementary, one place we looked specifically at was improving our lunch safety for our larger classes. As a result of class discussions, students recommitted to maintaining space during lunch sessions and some of the classes started using spaces that allowed them to spread out more. Grade 1 has moved to picnic lunches, grade 2, is now eating in the ES cafeteria, grade 4 adjusted spacing to maintain spaces, and grade 5 increased the use of the additional spaces near their classroom.

Students will explore, document, and share their understanding of an issue or opportunity of personal significance. This year's exhibition unit transdisciplinary theme is Sharing the Planet; An inquiry into rights and responsibilities in the struggle to share finite resources with other people and with other living things; communities and the relationships within and between them; access to equal opportunities; peace and conflict resolution.

Grade 5 students are working hard to consolidate their understanding of how to create central ideas and how key concepts are driving their inquiry. The exhibition unit 'Sharing the Planet' starts on Feb. 28 and ends on Apr. 29. They will need your encouragement and support throughout this exciting learning journey. It is imperative that students are present at school throughout the process collaborating with their group members. Supporting English Language Learners to Thrive In Elementary

At TASOK, we celebrate our identity as a community of multilingual learners from over 50 nationalities. The DRC itself is among the most linguistically diverse countries in the world and Congolese are experts in multilingual communication skills, adapting their language use for different environments and audiences. As Wlassoff describes in his article, Want to Be Smart?, being bilingual or multilingual definitely has benefits including advantages in flexible thinking, decision making, memory, multitasking, and a deeper understanding of language in general.

Becoming fluent in a language takes time, it is a process that can take 5 to 8 years. When new students join TASOK we use the WIDA Measure of Developing English Language (MODEL) assessment to determine how far they are in the language acquisition process and whether they need additional support. TASOK is a member of the WIDA International Consortium which keeps us up to date on the educational research and best practices we use in our English as an Additional Language (EAL) program.

What EAL Support looks like in the PYP program at TASOK:

• Inclusive: Most EAL support takes place in the regular classroom where students interact with their English speaking peers. In this setting, students participate in the grade level unit of Inquiry or content study, while also acquiring English and developing their listening, speaking, reading and writing language skills. (Leos and Saavedra 2010) As needed, students also participate in targeted small group sessions on specific language or literacy goals.



In this co-teaching session, the EAL teacher works with a small group, while the grade level teacher and TA conduct individual reading conferences.



EAL students practice their speaking skills as they act out a skit to demonstrate healthy behaviors alongside their native speaker peers.



Students in a guided reading group work together to identify English spelling patterns with the help of a classroom resource.

- Collaborative: The EAL teachers Co-plan, Co-teach, and Co-assess with the grade level teachers so that students at different language levels can understand the content. Studies show that through this collaboration process teachers are more effective. (Eells 2011; Knowapple, 2015)
- Focused on Academic Language: Social communication in a language is needed to build relationships
 and navigate a new setting. It takes longer to develop content specific vocabulary and the complex
 language used to compare, classify, combine information, evaluate, or infer. (Cummins) All students,
 including native English speakers, benefit from instruction on academic vocabulary and language
 structures.

- Positive: At each stage of language acquisition, the focus is on what students can do. (WIDA Can Do Philosophy) The bilingual/ multilingual identity of the child is affirmed and the other languages spoken by the child are recognized as assets.
- **Reflective:** Students are regularly led to inquire about language itself and it's real world applications. They reflect on the development of their communication skills as Approaches to Learning (ATLs) as well as their growth as a communicator in a multilingual community, nation, and world.



While exploring volume, students use academic vocabulary to discuss their ideas and explain their findings in a small group breakout session.



A student analyzes English and French Unit of Inquiry vocabulary terms for similarities and differences in word roots and spellings as part of a whole class session.



A newcomer builds sentences, vocabulary, and an understanding of English conjugation in the present continuous tense in the EAL resource room.



A 20-30\$ donation per vaccinated person will be recommended to enable the PTC to organize this drive.

Safety Practice - 'CODE ORANGE' Evacuation Drill

Last Tuesday (January 25th), we practiced a "CODE ORANGE" emergency drill. A CODE ORANGE requires all students and staff on the academic campus to go to one of the two soccer fields (whichever is closest). This type of emergency takes place when there may be a potential fire, or hazard in the school buildings that requires 'evacuation'. Students and staff practiced the routes and procedures in moving safely to the field, while also staying organized, socially distanced, and calm while attendance is taken on the fields.


(Fire or potential building hazard) SWEEPERS ENSURE ALL STUDENTS MOVE TO THE FIELDS

Throughout the remainder of the year, we will practice other types of drills including a "CODE BLUE" (Lockdown drill), 'CODE YELLOW' (return to homeroom/advisory), and a 'CODE RED' (shelter in place).





Like everything else, practicing these drills not only allows us to be more quick in response, but also look for many ways to improve the procedures in place.

Our next drill, a 'CODE BLUE' will take place later in February. (A 'CODE BLUE' means everyone moves to one of the two fallback rooms).



Personal Project Exhibition


Each year the MYP 5's go through a personal learning journey called the Personal Project. The Personal Project is a student-driven project which is reflective of their personal interest and or



How do I sign into the MySchoolWallet App for the first time?

- 1. Go to your App Store on your phone.
- 2. Search for MySchoolWallet and install.
- 3. Complete your profile and select The American School of Kinshasa as your school and hit PAY.











- 4. You will see various events and departments, listed as payment types. Select one of the payment types and follow the onscreen directions. Be sure to complete the student's name and fill out the NOTE with what the payment is for (for example, Instrument Deposit Fee or Student Store hat)
- 5. Please check the box "I would like to absorb processing costs so that the school receives my whole payment." Each transaction incurs a processing cost from the bank.
- 6. Once your transaction has gone through, you will receive an email confirmation and receipt

All payment options will be listed on tuition invoices. Instructions can be downloaded from the school website. We continue to partner with CommunityBrands/DiamondMind for safe digital payments.
