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SS Quarter 3 Reports and Three-Way Conferences Lesley Peacock - Secondary Principal

The Quarter 3 progress report for Grades 6-11 will be available on ManageBac the week after we return from the break on Friday 8th April. This report represents the progress your child has made at this stage of school year. I hope you have continued to access ManageBac to view reports, to monitor your child's progress through assessments, subject deadlines, and major homework/project assignments.

The Quarter 3 report concentrates on Learning Skills in the MYP and

includes a subject mark for Grade 11 This provides a picture of how your child is achieving and performing in all subject areas. If a student receives a 'NI', (or a failing mark of a 2 in Grade 11), then a comment is expected to explain this low assessment and strategies suggested for improvement.



The intention of the Progress Report is to provide an indication of performance and to follow this up with a more comprehensive picture of how your child is achieving through the 3-Way Conferences (Student-Parent-Teacher-Conferences) held at TASOK on Friday 22nd April.

The conferences will take place from 8.00-12:30 and 1:30-3.30. Teachers will be unavailable during lunch from 12.30-1.30 pm. During the conference, the teachers will be located in their rooms and parents

will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis, with each meeting session taking 8 minutes. Classes will not take place on this day, however, parents are required to bring their child/children to the 3-Way Conference. We believe that there should be

frequent contact between home and school and together we can both provide the best educational experience for your child.

Should you have any questions or concerns regarding your child's report, we would encourage you to discuss them with your child's teacher at the 3-Way Conference.

I would like to wish you an enjoyable and relaxing holiday and look forward to seeing our students return to on-campus learning on Monday 4th April.


What's Next?

DRA Testing during the month of April

In April, students in Kindergarten through grade 5 will be tested using the Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA) by their teachers. The DRA is a tool we use to assess student progress in reading and help us plan for future instruction and growth. Over the course of the month teachers will assess each student individually. Teachers will use the data from the assessment to support individual individual and group instruction.

Student Led Conferences-April 22nd

On April 22nd Student-led conferences will take place on the ES Campus. During conferences 3-4 families will be scheduled in each classroom at the same time. Students will lead parents through their learning journeys. Students will spend 20-25 minutes in the classrooms and will also visit the single subjects as part of their conferences. The total conference time for each student will be approximately 45 minutes.

PYP Exhibition- Community invite April 28, 8:00-9:00 am

On April 28th the PYP Exhibition will take place. Parents of all grades are welcome to join the students between 8:00-9:00 AM. After the parent and visitor presentation, students from throughout the elementary and secondary schools will be invited to attend. This unit represents the culmination of the elementary school program and is highly recommended for all who are able to attend.

New classroom locations-





Gr. 4 - How We Organize Ourselves Kindergarten - How We Express Ourselves

March was an exciting month for elementary school! We celebrated and shared our learning with parents and other grade levels. It was a great opportunity to see students confidently and respectfully interacting and engaging with other students, teachers, and parents.

Grade 4 students demonstrated their understanding of the central idea "**Markets function in response to the needs and wants of communities.**" Their inquiry into the development and marketing of a product or service, how a marketplace functions, and decision making in an economic system. Evidence of their research skills and thinking skills were shown in many places.



In Kindergarten, students learned how poetry can be used to express ideas and connect people. They inquired into different types of poetry, how poetry connects people and the different ways we express and share our appreciation of poetry. At the end of the unit, the students, together with their teacher, presented a poetry cafe to all the Kindergarten parents. It was a wonderful time celebrating their learning and an opportunity to view all the poems they had created.





PYP Francophonie week Brigitte Suda & Nancy Eale - ES French teachers

La Francophonie

Bonjour, tout le monde!

What better way to celebrate our learning in French and celebrate with the community, than through simple phrases!

The big question around the Francophonie is: What is "Le Monde Francophone"?

In a nutshell, Le Monde Francophone is "the French-speaking world," or simply those parts of the world where French -- or some form of French -- is spoken. "L'Afrique Francophone" because of where we are (in the Democratic Republic of Congo), we focus mainly on French-speaking countries in Africa, including the island countries. The island countries are not on the African continent but are considered to be part of Africa. Our research led us to discover that there are 54 countries in Africa, depending on the key concept "perspective".

The key word for our learning engagement is **Action:** The big part of the learning (I can take personal action and apply my learning and ideas into real-life situations.

Students continue to develop basic concepts in French language and culture, including pronunciation, grammar, vocabulary and how to conjugate verbs. For example, we learned how to name the countries using their French names. In some cases, this is the same as their names in English. In others, it's spelled and pronounced differently in French.

Students enhanced and further developed their use of French for balanced development of all four skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

The importance of communication and cultural awareness is stressed through a wide variety of activities, mainly group/pair work.



Advanced French - We began the week identifying, understanding and adopting this big concept 'La Francophonie'. With students being French speakers, we studied what this meant to us and realized that we are part of this big community of Francophones.

With both the lower and the upper elementary students we used creative arts, oral communication in French to continue to develop a positive relationship with the language using creativity and innovation to build this concept of self-knowledge and building relationships with others around us.

This creative activity led lower elementary students to become aware of the actions and gestures posing in French. First students became aware of these through a class discussion. Then we used artistic creation where students decorated their character to represent them with their common cultural references to self-express their sense of belonging in this huge community.

With the upper elementary students, this creative activity encouraged each student to reflect on their Francophone identity and on the links created with one's community. Through a discussion we reflected on our francophone identity and the connections and possible links between the different parts that exist within our class. This discussion led each student to decorate a quilt piece using a card to illustrate their identity.

Later in the week we were very glad to have a writer Madame Diana Nzeba Ilunga as a guest speaker within our TASOK walls to share her book with our students and to talk about her experience as a writer. She presented her two books titled 'Les Supers Ilunga' which talks about kindness, helping our neighbor no matter if he or she is hurt inside or outside. In these sessions, Mrs Ilunga shared about her experience as a writer, the process of writing, designing and printing a book. She read one of her stories with the students, she got the children to think about possible stories for her next book, the students sketched possible super-heros and played games.

We ended the week with some fun celebrating this wonderful concept and community of French speakers with both the beginners and advanced students.

Assessment in the Diploma Programme

With Diploma Programme exams right around the corner, this is an opportune time to discuss what assessments are like in the DP and how they contribute to earning the diploma. Each subject has three to five assessments designed by the IB that together contribute to the final score in each subject. These assessments are broken down into two categories: internal and external assessments. Each is weighted anywhere from 20% to 40% of the final grade, and all final grades are on a 7 point scale. Those grades are then used to determine whether students have earned their IB diploma.

Internal Assessments (IAs)

These are IB designed assessments that are graded by the subject teacher and then moderated by the IB. Moderation means that a few samples are sent to official examiners to determine that the grades given by the teachers are accurate. Students work on their IAs during the 2 years of the class and submit to the IB before exams begin. They require a combination of in class and out of class time to complete, with guidance and feedback throughout by their teacher. Some examples of IAs are the art exhibition, a history investigation, science experiment and report, and the TOK exhibition.

External Assessments

Most people think of the DP exams when talking about the external assessments. The exams for the class of 2022 begin April 28, 2022 and go on for three weeks. Each exam is called a "paper" and subjects can have anywhere from one to three different papers over the examination period. They come in a variety of formats, including essays, multiple choice questions, case studies, text-response, and a variety of short to extended response questions depending on the subject. All of the students' answer booklets are sent off to the IB, who then distribute them to subject examiners for marking. However, not all

external assessments are examinations. There are also writing pieces, art portfolios, and theatre pieces that are externally assessed by the IB. The one thing they all have in common is that they are not marked by our teachers but instead by IB examiners.

Awarding of the Diploma

Passing conditions in the DP can be a little complicated, but there are some very basic requirements that are important to focus on. A diploma candidate requires 24 points to earn the diploma. Each student takes 6 subjects, so that would require an average of 4 points per subject to meet the minimum passing requirement. However, of the 24 points, at least 12 must come from their HL subjects and at least 9 must come from their SL subjects. In addition to the points they earn from their subjects, students can earn up to 3 additional points from their extended essay and TOK class. That means the maximum score a student can earn in the DP is 45 points. See the matrix below to understand how those extra points are awarded.

TASOK offers families and companies the convenience of making tuition payments online. To provide this method of payment, we partner with Diamond Mind/Community Brands, an independent school payment service provider. All payment information is completely secure using the highest security standards in the industry.



WEBSITE OPTION

Go to the school website's "Tuition Payment Portal" link, or enter directly clicking here: <u>PAYMENT PORTAL</u>

- Sign-up to set up an online account;
- Enter student first name, last name and ID with payment information; the student ID # is on the invoice;
- Submit payment. Payment acceptance methods and any fees associated with an electronic payment are outlined in the payment portal.

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MOBILE OPTION

You can also pay using our mobile payment app: MySchoolWallet Intro Video Signing into the MySchoolWallet App for the first time?

- Go to the App Store on your phone. <u>Apple Store</u> <u>Google Play Store</u>
- Search for MySchoolWallet and install.
- Complete your profile and select The American School of Kinshasa as your school and hit PAY.
- You will see various events and departments, listed as payment types. Select one of the payment types and follow the onscreen directions. Be sure to complete the student's name and fill out the NOTE with what the payment is for (for example, Tuition or Student Store)
- Please check the box "I would like to absorb processing costs so that the school receives my whole payment." Each transaction incurs a processing cost from the bank.
- Once your transaction has gone through, you will receive an email confirmation and receipt.

Note that payments can be made via credit card (worldwide), debit card or echeck (for US accounts only). For online payments, receipts are automatically generated after each transaction.

BANKING OPTION

- Direct deposits (cash or check) at bank counters into TASOK's account are accepted.
- Wire or ACH transfers are accepted.
- Online banking from your bank DRC or US bank to ours is possible. Check with your institution for options available to you.
- Most US transfer options work: wire, ACH, e-check, BillPay, Zelle, etc... These options are only available for US transactions, not international.
- Once the transaction is complete, send the confirmation to us.

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ON CAMPUS OPTION

- TASOK has an ATM station on campus. The ATM machine is located just outside of the Administration Building.
- TASOK Cashier Office accepts debit and credit cards for payments via POS. Both ATM & POS accept VISA [®] & Mastercard [®].
- TASOK Cashier Office accepts paper checks issued to The American School of Kinshasa. Checks from a local DRC or US bank are accepted.

Help is available at the office to help you navigate the TASOK website and experiment with the tuition portal or the mobile app! If you need copies of invoices/agreements or would like a receipt for your payment, please email <u>accounts@tasok.net</u>.

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On March 23, I had the privilege to facilitate a webinar on the impact of COVID-19 on business operations with peers in the Africa region through the AISA platform. AISA is the Association of International Schools in Africa of which TASOK is a member.

The webinar was designed as a space for business, finance & HR managers to (re)connect, share experience/ideas and seek advice. The session was co-facilitated by Anemone Basabakwinshi, an independent consultant with experience in international schools.
