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
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Day of the Dot




Secondary Student Council

TASOK was ready for the big week!








Elementary Student Council-

A lot of behind the scenes work has been happening in collaborative planning sessions. MYP and DP teachers have been standardizing assessments in order to build common understandings and increase our accuracy in assessing student work against the MYP and DP criteria. This is a really valuable exercise and the conversations in teams have been very productive, helping us reflect on how we teach and assess and on the skills that connect the MYP and DP.

The Grade 12 students and their supervisors are nearing the end of the Extended Essay process. Students

will submit their final drafts by October 16th, have their final meetings, and reflect on their research & writing experience, finishing up on November 8th. Grade 11 students will start their Extended Essay journey in November.




Getting to know the PYP

Thank you, parents, for joining our first ES parent workshop, Getting to Know the PYP. It was a very engaging and meaningful session learning about the PYP. We talked about the key elements of the PYP and

the inquiry cycle and what learning looks like using the grade 3 unit, How We Organize Ourselves. For the parents who weren't able to attend, these are some main ideas shared.

The PYP is a curriculum framework from Preschool to Grade 5. It is based on the belief that all children are capable of in-depth learning and that they learn best by doing. The PYP focuses on five key elements:

- **Knowledge**: The PYP curriculum is based on a broad and challenging set of transdisciplinary themes. These themes are designed to help students develop a deep understanding of the world around them.
- **Conceptual Understandings**: Conceptual understanding allows the learners to apply what they learn in all areas of their lives. Each unit and subject has a set of key and related concepts they focus on. The PYP curriculum focuses on seven key concepts: form, function, causation, change, connection, perspective, and responsibility. Some examples of related concepts are diversity, culture, continuity, progress, technology, control, relationships, etc.
- **Skills**: The PYP curriculum emphasizes the development of both academic and transferable skills. ATL (Approaches to Learning) Skills include thinking skills, social skills, communication skills, research skills, and self-management skills.
- **Dispositions**: The PYP curriculum values the development of positive attitudes towards learning and others. The IB learner profile represents 10 attributes valued by IB World Schools. Learner Profile Attributes: Inquirers, Knowledgeable, Thinkers, Communicators, Principled, Open-Minded, Caring, Risk-Takers, Balanced, Reflective
- **Action**: The PYP curriculum encourages students to take action to make a difference in the world. This action can be taken at the individual, local, or global level.

We use Kath Murdoch's inquiry cycle which is well-aligned with the PYP as a model for teaching and learning. The inquiry cycle consists of six phases:

- Tuning in: engage students' interest in the topic of inquiry
- Finding out: gather information about the topic of inquiry through a variety of activities
- Sorting out: process the information students have gathered and begin to develop their own understandings
- Going further: extend students' learning by exploring the topic of inquiry in more depth
- Making conclusions: draw conclusions about their learning and share their findings with others
- Taking action: take action to make a difference in the world based on their learning (Action can happen anywhere in the inquiry cycle. It can be actions for learning and as a result of learning.)

There are many ways that you can support your child's learning in the PYP. Here are a few tips:

- Talk to your child about their learning. Ask them what they are learning in school and what they are interested in learning more about.
- Help your child to find resources to support their learning. This could include books, websites, or even people who can share their knowledge and expertise.
- Encourage your child to ask questions. Let them know that there are no such things as silly questions.

- Help your child to think critically about what they are learning. Encourage them to question the information they are presented with and to come up with their own ideas and opinions.
- Celebrate your child's successes. Let them know that you are proud of their hard work and their learning.


