

Trent 'Trentino' Parcells Grade 3A Teacher

Background & Journey

Mr. Trentino Parcells, TASOK's dedicated 3rd-grade teacher, comes from a family immersed in education. His father was a college professor, and both of his siblings became teachers. Recalling his childhood visits to their schools, Mr. Parcells shares, "I was fascinated by the environment and how knowledge could shape young minds, and that naturally drew me to teaching." His journey to TASOK started with a friend's recommendation, and both he and his wife, Ms. Sofi, felt an immediate connection to the school and its mission.

Teaching Philosophy

For Mr. Parcells, teaching is about making learning enjoyable and relevant. He is committed to fostering creativity and critical thinking in his students, helping them see the importance of lifelong learning. He emphasizes, "I want my students to realize that learning is a journey, and it can be fun. You can be smart and still have a great time while doing it."

His approach incorporates humor and practical insights, aiming to make every lesson both engaging and meaningful.

Reflecting on his mentors, Mr. David recalls Stef Bergh, the former PHE teacher and Athletic Director at TASOK. "Stef taught me that by spreading positive vibes and nurturing a positive mindset through my coaching, students can perform at a high level," he says. This approach has become a cornerstone of Mr. David's coaching philosophy, shaping not only better athletes but well-rounded individuals.

Through his dedication, passion, and belief in the values that sports can impart, Mr. David continues to inspire the students at TASOK, helping them strive for both athletic and personal excellence.

What is your favorite part of working in an elementary school library?

"I love supporting kids from Preschool to Grade 5 in finding the perfect books, reading stories to them, and cataloging new books for our shelves."

Can you share a memorable moment you've had with a student in the library?

"One moment I'll always remember is a third-grade student who told me they love spending their recesses in the library because '*it*'s one of the safer places to be in the school, and you always answer my questions and help me find the books I want.' That was very touching."

What kinds of books do elementary students gravitate toward?

"Preschool to Grade 2 students tend to love fiction picture books, while students from Grade 3 to 5 are more into fiction chapter books, from easy to advanced."

How do you incorporate diverse cultural perspectives into your library recommendations?

"I make sure we order books with diverse cultural perspectives and display them prominently to encourage students to read them. I also include these books in my library lessons."

What's one book you believe every child should read, and why?

"<u>The Word Collector</u>. It shows the transformative power of words and how they impact our daily lives."

Cultural Experiences

Having taught in Mexico and Colombia before moving to the DRC, Mr. Parcells has embraced the diversity of international teaching. He reflects on his time abroad, stating, "Living in different cultures has opened my mind to new perspectives, both in my personal life and in the classroom." Adjusting to life in the DRC has been a new challenge for him, particularly learning local languages and navigating urban settings. Despite these hurdles, he remains optimistic, seeing each challenge as a new opportunity to grow.

Building Connections

Building strong relationships with his students is one of Mr. Parcells' primary goals. "I want my students to feel like they belong, that they matter in the classroom," he says. He achieves this by fostering a sense of respect and community through interactive games, personal check-ins, and a warm, inviting classroom atmosphere. Mr. Parcells strongly believes in the power of personal connections, much like those he valued as a student.

Challenges & Growth

Adaptation has been a constant theme in Mr. Parcells' career, particularly in new cultural environments. He notes, "Teaching in different countries has taught me the importance of flexibility and cultural sensitivity."

While his previous experiences in Spanish-speaking countries helped him blend in more easily, the DRC has been a more complex environment to navigate. Yet, these challenges have only strengthened his belief in remaining open to change and learning from each experience.

How do you make the library welcoming for students not yet interested in reading?


"By being kind, greeting students, answering their questions, and helping them find books that match their interests. It's important to create an inviting environment."

"We let students check out books to read with their parents at home. Parents are welcome to come to the library during early recess and share books with their children."




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
Favorite Subjects & Classroom Environment

Secondary School - Library lessons on citation


Students in Grades 6-10 are almost finished learning the fundamentals of MLA citation. Once we finish these lessons, we can happily move on to more fun activities!



A Message From Grade 5

Unit of Inquiry: Sharing the Planet Begins with Awareness

Our Grade 5 students recently kicked off an exciting journey into the "Sharing the Planet" unit. The central idea, "Conflict, injustice, and inequality lead people to seek changes," provided a deep context for hands-on learning through the "tall building" challenge. This activity, aimed at highlighting real-world inequalities, gave students a chance to explore these concepts in action.





A Conversation About Fairness and Change Following the activity, the class engaged in a thoughtful debrief about fairness, conflict, and the emotions that arise from inequality. This discussion sparked important reflections about justice and change, laying the groundwork for further inquiry into this thought-provoking unit. Students left with a sense of purpose as they prepare to explore how to address these global issues.

Hands-On Learning: The Tall Building Challenge In the challenge, students worked in groups to construct the tallest paper towers. Some teams had unlimited resources, while others faced restrictions. This unequal distribution of materials led to frustration and even conflict, mirroring real-life inequalities that people experience daily. The challenge served as a microcosm of how scarcity and privilege can shape interactions and outcomes.





PYP Parent Coffee Session: Engaging with Inquiry-Based Learning Lorna Ossmann

In our recent parent workshop, families could experience the heart of the PYP approach through a hands-on "Mystery Box Inquiry" activity. Parents worked together to explore objects, ask questions, and connect their discoveries to broader concepts, mirroring the inquiry-based learning process our students use in the classroom. This session provided valuable insight into how the PYP fosters curiosity, critical thinking, and holistic development. We thank all the parents for their active participation and thoughtful reflections.



Why is inquiry important? Inquiry encourages students to take ownership of their learning by asking questions, exploring ideas, and making meaningful connections to the world around them. It helps develop lifelong learners who are not only knowledgeable but also open-minded and reflective. As a parent, you can support this process at home by asking open-ended questions that spark curiosity, such as:

"What new questions did you ask today?""How did you find out more about something that interested you?"

- "What connections can you make between your learning and your own life?" These questions help keep the spirit of inquiry alive and encourage children to think deeply, reflect, and take action based on their learning.
